An Evening with Imre & Marne van Opstal

We open our season with a double bill from Dutch sibling choreographic duo Imre and Marne van Opstal, whose evocative work sees dance as a poetic, emotional laboratory—exploring the vulnerability of being human in all its rawness, beauty, and absurdity. Since their 2022 Ballet BC debut with the electric *Heart Drive*, their meteoric rise has included starry collaborations with the likes of Dior and FKA Twigs, Germany's prestigious Der Faust Award for the visionary and hallucinatory *Voodoo Waltz*, and major new commissions from the Gothenburg Opera Dance Company and the Paris Opera Ballet, among others. Experience their acclaimed *I'm afraid to forget your smile* along with a highly anticipated new creation.

i'm afraid to forget your smile

North American Premiere

Choreography: Imre and Marne van Opstal

Movement and live vocals converge in this groundbreaking work for six dancers and 16 voices. Joined on stage by the Vancouver Chamber Choir in their first collaboration with the company, *I'm afraid to forget your smile* meditates on the moment of letting go as a transition to surrender and loss. In a series of mesmerizing solos and duets, part one explores the deeply personal struggle we all face with memory and emotion. In part two, the focus shifts to the collective, with striking group images that mirror the layered unity of the choir. Physically demanding and emotionally charged, the dancers move through raw, powerful choreography that reveals human fragility and our ability to face our own limitations.

new van opstal

World Premiere

Choreography: Imre and Marne van Opstal

Building on a distinctive and evolving choreographic canon, the van Opstals share a world premiere with Vancouver audiences, their second creation for Ballet BC. The new work continues their ongoing artistic inquiry, which they describe as a "physical language hyper-attuned to the zeitgeist: layered in meaning and constantly searching the fringes of human experience." Expect a daring, conceptually rich journey that reflects the complexities of our time while boldly pushing into new expressive territory. A rare West Coast opportunity to witness the evolving vision of two of today's most sought-after voices in dance.

The centrepiece of our 40th anniversary season, this era-defining weekend captures the essence of what Ballet BC has become: rooted in legacy, deeply collaborative, and fearless in its pursuit of bold, boundary-pushing creation. Across two programs, five distinct works come together to create a live dance experience like no other.

At Thursday and Friday evening performances, we present the North American premiere of William Forsythe's *Undertainment* and unveil a world premiere by Artistic Director Medhi Walerski, alongside the anticipated return of Bobbi Jene Smith and Or Schraiber's *Obsidian*.

In special one-day-only presentations, Saturday's audiences will experience a capsule creation from Artists-in-Residence Margaret Grenier and Starr Muranko—a reflection of the company's studio work with the choreographers over a five-year period. The program also features a poignant guest duet performed by dancers of the National Ballet of Canada, alongside *Undertainment* and Walerski's new work.

undertainment

North American Premiere
Choreography: William Forsythe

The work of the incomparable William Forsythe returns to the Ballet BC stage with *Undertainment*. Called “fiendishly fascinating” (*The Guardian*) and “a mesmerizing new work” (*New York Times*), the visionary 2025 piece for 16 dancers starts with a signature toolbox of improvisational prompts, creating a structural order within which the performers can explore. Intended as a musical event as much as anything else, the dancers serve flexibly as instrumentalists, each with their own responsibilities and expertise in a self-generated system of sound and movement. A fresh and unmissable portrayal of commitment, risk, and imagination from a truly legendary creator.

obsidian

Choreography: Bobbi Jene Smith and Or Schraiber

Obsidian returns—an arresting creation from Ballet BC’s newly-appointed Resident Choreographers and voracious dancemakers Bobbi Jene Smith and Or Schraiber. Set to a score of rare and riveting 1920s piano compositions by George Gurdjieff and Thomas de Hartmann performed live on stage, the work unfolds through magnetic partnering, searing solos, and fiercely committed physicality. Infused with elements of traditional folk dance and movement language stemming from the duo’s Batsheva roots, *Obsidian* pulses with tension and intimacy.

Ballet BC Artistic Director and French choreographer Medhi Walerski unveils his ninth world premiere for the company, and final as its leader—an eagerly anticipated work that marks the culmination of a defining artistic chapter and the curation of a visionary and significant repertoire that is both fearless and unmistakable. The new creation promises to showcase the qualities that continue to highlight his artistic identity: bold imagination, rigorous craft, and an unwavering belief in the potential of the human body and the power of connection.

new grenier / muranko

World Premiere
Choreography: Margaret Grenier and Starr Muranko

Created by Ballet BC Artists-in-Residence, choreographers, and arts leaders Margaret Grenier (Gitxsan/Mushkegowuck (Swampy Cree)) and Starr Muranko (Mushkegowuck (Swampy Cree)), this new offering is the culmination of a meaningful five-year relationship with the company and its 20 dancers. Shaped through shared space and collaboration since 2020, the original piece explores a journey grounded in trust and reciprocity. Drawing on Indigenous music and dance, Grenier and Muranko’s work weaves movement with embodied storytelling—honouring story, land, and lineage as living presences within the creative process and carrying forward teachings cultivated over time. A testament to what can emerge when artistic practice is rooted in mutual respect and collective discovery.

A special contribution from The National Ballet of Canada’s Sharing the Stage initiative in honour of their 75th anniversary and Ballet BC’s 40th: *On the Nature of Daylight*—a deeply moving pas de deux by the company’s resident choreographer David Dawson. Performed by guest principal dancers and set to a beloved score of the same name by British composer Max Richter, the breathtaking piece unfolds as a poetic meditation on love in all its complexity. Through sweeping movement and intimate connection, two dancers embody the universal search for one another, capturing the delicate tension between longing and fulfillment, closeness and distance. Powerful and profound, the work reflects the mysteries of love that shape our lives and bind us together.

An Evening with Crystal Pite

A full evening with one of the world's most iconic names in dance, Vancouver's Crystal Pite. This triple bill brings together three striking works that showcase the range and emotional depth of Pite's impressive choreographic canon. From a poignant ode to loss and acceptance performed in falling snow, to a razor-sharp commentary on power set around a boardroom table, to a sweeping ensemble work against an awe-inspiring curtain of light—experience the brilliance of *Solo Echo*, *The Statement*, and the BC premiere of *Angels' Atlas*. A fitting finale to a historic season, this unmissable event honours an artist whose connection with Ballet BC spans nearly four decades and whose unparalleled creativity and commitment continues to resonate deeply with audiences around the globe.



solo echo

Choreography: Crystal Pite

The soulful and beloved *Solo Echo* returns to the Ballet BC stage for the first time since 2018. Performed to two sonatas by Johannes Brahms—touchstones for Pite at various points in her life—the work is a profound meditation on acceptance and loss. Seven dancers embody a single character reckoning with himself at the end of life, moving from nuanced duets and solos to a complex and expansive collective body. With further inspiration from Mark Strand's poem "Lines for Winter," the piece is set against a serene backdrop of falling snow, with elements of winter, music, and the moving body drawing the audience into a world of yearning and reflection.

the statement

Choreography: Crystal Pite

The Statement is a striking one-act play that enthralls from beginning to end. Four dancers move to a brilliant and incisive script by Canadian playwright and frequent Pite collaborator Jonathon Young. Locked in a contest for power and control, the highly engaging characters are charged with fueling a conflict in a distant country, and tension escalates as they confront the ethical weight of their actions. Character "A" declares: "For generations they've been fighting. We used it as an opportunity—the attacks—the—for investment. For growth. We used it." A searing and particularly timely work from a pair of visionary creators.

angels' atlas

Choreography: Crystal Pite

A breathtaking piece for 36 dancers, guest artists from Arts Umbrella and Modus Operandi join Ballet BC dancers for the Vancouver premiere of Pite's colossal *Angels' Atlas*. Light plays a starring role here as it dances on a pivoting, reflective topography, creating conditions for the unexpected to appear. Backed by a score of original music by Owen Belton and choral works by Pyotr Ilyich Tchaikovsky and Morten Lauridsen, the dancers embody humanity's impermanence in an immense and enigmatic world. *Angels' Atlas* charts the territories that exist beyond our understanding, continuing Pite's near-constant inquiry into the question of what moves us.

Ballet BC Annex provides school-aged students across the province with a unique opportunity to experience professional contemporary dance. Each season, a junior company of Annex dancers—drawn from Vancouver-based training institutions Arts Umbrella and Modus Operandi—perform on tour throughout BC, sharing repertoire by emerging and established choreographers and offering engaging workshops to young audiences. In addition to bringing world-class dance to schools and communities with limited access to the arts, the program serves as a vital stepping stone for pre-professional dancers, building their stage experience and offering an opportunity to collaborate with emerging choreographers.

This season, Ballet BC Annex will premiere new creations by BC-based choreographer Cameron Fraser-Monroe and Ballet BC company artist Michael Garcia, and share a reimaging of *Last Flower* by Vancouver's Out Innerspace, commissioned by the company in 2024.

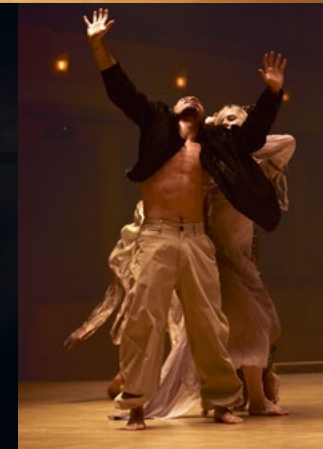
